Dear Parents/Carers

It has been another incredibly busy term at Guilsborough. Given the impact of the pandemic on education nationally, in particular the potential for organising educational visits off site, I am delighted to report that a number of fantastic trips have taken place over the past few weeks. A-level Media Studies students have visited Leavesden Studios near Watford, we have History trips for Year 11 taking place this week alongside a whole host of national and international opportunities being planned as we speak. At Guilsborough we believe passionately that learning is not something limited to the classroom so we're incredibly fortunate to have a body of staff willing to give up time to support these visits.

In addition to the above, 28 Year 11 students and 5 Year 13 students have successfully completed Duke of Edinburgh Silver and Gold expeditions. We're incredibly proud of the students involved in this scheme who have demonstrated a high level of resilience as well as proving they have problem solving, team working and communication skills which will stand them in good stead for life beyond Guilsborough.

The events in Ukraine have touched many of us. I am incredibly proud of the staff and students at Guilsborough who have shown themselves to be caring global citizens having organised cake sales and collections to raise money to support people in Ukraine. Events like this are important, not only for raising funds to support the people in Ukraine, but also in raising awareness across our community.

We cannot ignore the significant disruption to education students have faced nationally since the pandemic began, staff are working tirelessly to ensure the impact of this is minimised. To support with this and in order to ensure our students are

fully prepared for final examinations we have welcomed 'Elevate' into the academy to deliver sessions to Year 10 and Year 11 focused on the use of practice examination papers, high impact revision activities and techniques for managing examination stress. The feedback from the students involved was incredibly positive and as a consequence we are exploring similar sessions for years 7-9.



# Sixth Form A Level Media Trip

On Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> February, 30 Sixth Form A Level Media students headed to Leavesden Studios near Watford for a Harry Potter workshop and studio tour. Having watched all the Harry Potter films, I really enjoyed seeing all the film sets, 'behind the scenes' exhibits and costumes in real life – it was so interesting and really gave us an insight into all the work that goes into making such a huge production. The studios felt quite magical and really set the scene for the movies with the Harry Potter tune playing throughout the tour. Before the tour, the staff ran a workshop based on camera skills, which was really fun and exciting, and complemented the work we have been doing in class. We looked at a





range of camera angles, movement and shot types, and discussed the impact these have on an audience. The staff explained the importance of storyboarding and showed us props that aren't included in the tour, which was really cool and engaging. They also showed the dress/cape that Voldemort wore, explaining the significance of the colour of his costume (the green of his cape fades as the films progress to show his power diminishing) - which was very clever.

The tour itself took us through The Great Hall, showed us props and costumes galore, offered us Butter Beer, gave us the chance to ride a broomstick, opportunities for photos beside the Night Bus and a walk along Diagon Alley – to name but a few highlights!

The experience was very beneficial for our Media course and the workshop re-capped skills and information that we need to know for the course in a fun and easy way. The staff were very friendly and passionate about the studios and provided lots of extra information about the sets and costumes which was really fascinating to listen to.



Overall, the trip really opened my eyes to how much work, effort and time goes into making blockbusters like Harry Potter but also gave us plenty to think about in terms of the range of job opportunities within the film industry. I definitely recommend visiting!!

The coach journey back to Guilsborough was very peaceful!

We will have bumper numbers completing their Awards this year, as so much amazing work has gone on behind the scenes by our amazing students. Over 40 are awaiting Expeditions to complete their Awards and we look forward to further success.



Year 10 had a **Study Sensei** seminar which covered the following:

- Utilising the syllabus to frame study
- Structuring and reviewing organised notes
- Conceptual learning to develop deep understanding
- Utilising practice exam papers
- Standing out through independent learning



Year 11 had an Ace Your Exams seminar which covered the following:

- Highest value exam preparation tasks
- Fixing mistakes to ensure constant improvement
- Time allocation during exam preparation
- Techniques for managing stress & time pressure in exams

The feedback from students on these sessions was extremely positive, with over 93% feeling it was time well spent in both year groups.

We will be cultivating and re-establishing the schools allotment and using the produce.


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## **Biodiversity**




1. Students need to log into their Educake account using their username and password





# County lines: what you need to know

Children of all ages and backgrounds are at risk of being exploited by criminal gangs who'll use them to transport drugs and money around the country. This is 'county lines' in a nutshell. Despite the coronavirus pandemic, gangs have continued to exploit children, so it's important you know what it is and what signs to look out for.

## What is county lines?

- A child is 'groomed' by a criminal gang, then exploited to transport drugs and money from one area (county) to another usually from an urban location to a rural or coastal one. Grooming can happen in person, or online on social media apps like Snapchat
- > The child may be trafficked to the gang's 'trap houses' or 'bandos' miles away from home, to find 'customers', deal with rival gangs and sell drugs
- To the gang, the child is an expendable commodity. They're likely to face violence and sexual exploitation
- The 'line' refers to the phone line that the gang uses for selling drugs

### Should I be worried?

Hopefully not. However, **any child is vulnerable to exploitation**. Criminal gangs are known to target:

- Children with vulnerabilities, such as poverty, family breakdown, exclusion from school because they're susceptible to manipulation and coercion
- Children from stable or affluent families because they're less likely to be known to the
  police and may blend in better in the town the gang sends them to
- Girls and young children as well as boys and teenagers children as young as 7 are being groomed by gangs, and girls are often groomed into relationships with gang members or used to transport drugs as they're less likely to be stopped by the police

## What are the signs I should be looking out for?

If your child is affected by county lines exploitation, there may be some signs. Here are some **key indicators** that you should look out for.

Is your child:

Returning home late, staying out all night or going missing?	Receiving unexplained money, phone(s), clothes or jewellery?	
Being found in areas away from home?	Increasingly disruptive or aggressive?	
Increasing their drug use, or being found to have large amounts of drugs on them?	Using sexual, drug-related or violent language you wouldn't expect them to know?	
Being secretive about who they are talking to and where they are going?	Coming home with injuries or looking particularly dishevelled?	
Having unexplained absences from school or college?	Having hotel cards or keys to unknown places?	



Answering yes to any of these questions does not mean your child is being exploited through county lines. However, you should talk to them about any one of these signs.

## What should I do if I suspect my child is being exploited?

Try to stay calm and seek help straight away - there are organisations that can help you. You could do any of the following depending on your circumstances, **but you must tell someone**:

- ➤ Report your concerns to children's social care <a href="https://www.gov.uk/report-child-abuse-to-local-council">https://www.gov.uk/report-child-abuse-to-local-council</a>. A social worker will be able to listen to your concerns and help you to protect your child
- Contact our school. Ask to speak to the designated safeguarding lead and explain your concerns to them. They will be able to advise you where to go next
- Contact your local police station or call 101. If your child is missing, remember you don't have to wait 24 hours before making a report

If you believe your child is in immediate danger, or a threat is made against you or another family member, **call 999 immediately**
