GOLD QUALIFYING EXPEDITION FOR DUKE OF EDINBURGH PARTICIPANTS IN SNOWDONIA

A group of our determined students completed their Duke of Edinburgh's Award Gold Qualifying Expedition in the picturesque landscape of Snowdonia from Thursday 26 September to Sunday 29 September 2024.

The four-day venture, which stretched from Porthmadog to Dolgellau, saw participants navigate through challenging terrain, braving both unpredictable weather and long hikes to earn their prestigious Gold Award.

The expedition, carefully planned in advance by the students themselves, included route mapping and teamwork, essential skills that are integral to the Duke of Edinburgh Award criteria. The students were transported by coach from the Academy to the starting point, Porthmadog, early on Thursday morning, with all necessary equipment in tow. Equipped with maps, compasses, and essential survival gear, they embarked on their trek across Snowdonia.

As part of the assessment process, each student had to demonstrate proficiency in navigation, campcraft, and endurance, which were monitored by experienced assessors. The route included varied terrains, from coastal paths to mountainous regions, providing both a physical and mental challenge. By Sunday afternoon, all participants successfully reached Dolgellau, where they were greeted with a sense of accomplishment and pride.

This expedition marks the culmination of months of preparation, which began with a practice expedition earlier in the year. The students demonstrated resilience, teamwork, and leadership throughout the journey, qualities that the Duke of Edinburgh's Award aims to foster.

Mr Flanagan, Head of Life Skills & Duke of Edinburgh's Award Manager, expressed his pride in the students, noting their determination and positive attitudes, even when faced with tough conditions, saying:

"It's been incredible to watch them push through the challenges and grow as individuals. This experience will undoubtedly stay with them for years to come."

As the students returned to Guilsborough Academy on the Sunday evening, the sense of camaraderie and achievement was palpable. Many of them are now one step closer to receiving their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award, a nationally recognised achievement that reflects their commitment, resilience, and skills.

We look forward to celebrating the students' successes in an official ceremony, later in the year.

This trip was not only a memorable experience but also a key stepping stone in the students' educational journey, reinforcing the power of live performance in modern theatre.







Phishing is a type of cybercrime that involves tricking people into sharing sensitive information or installing malware. Phishing attacks can be carried out through emails, text messages, phone calls, or websites.

Phishing attacks are dangerous because they can lead to identity theft, financial loss, and other cybercrimes. Some examples of phishing attacks include:


• General phishing

On Saturday 21 September, Corby East Midlands International Pool hosted the Northamptonshire Swimming County Short Course Competition 2024. In addition to my role as Principal, I am also Head Swimming Coach at Rushden Swimming Club, taking swimmers to County, Regional and National championships and I regularly attend swimming meets where I am proud to support and cheer on our students who participate.

This particular weekend featured the County Short Course Sprints, which is an entry-level event for representation at County, Regional, and even higher levels of competition. It was wonderful to see several of our students competing with great enthusiasm and skill.

I'd like to extend special congratulations to the following students for their impressive performances:

- Lacy-Mae and Hannah, both in Year 7, swam superbly and beat their previous personal bests in several events. They both won their respective heats in the 50m Backstroke - an incredible achievement for two of our newest members of the academy community!
- Evie, in Year 10, competed in four events: 100m Individual Medley, 50m Backstroke, 50m Breaststroke, and 50m Freestyle. She achieved personal bests in two of these races, showcasing her continued dedication and improvement.

It's always a joy to see our students excelling in activities they are passionate about outside of school, and I couldn't be prouder of all of these students' hard work and accomplishments. These competitions provide valuable experience and help develop qualities like perseverance and determination, which are equally important in the classroom.


